

Chart updated April 19, 2018 – since July 2015 we have recycled 245 tons!

Materials	We Accept	We Cannot Accept	Where Does It GO ?
Aluminum Cans 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Rinsed beverage cans 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> cans that have a synthetic coating (like most pop-top pet food cans) Foil sheeting, plates, or trays (even clean) 	Back into more beverage cans
Tin Cans 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Clean food cans Canning jar rings 	NO <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Fuel cans Aerosol cans Tin cans or lids coated with rubber or plastic 	Melted down and made into any number of ferrous metal items
Non-Ferrous Metals 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Scrap aluminum (clean of other materials) Brass Copper pipe and insulated copper wire All items must fit into a 4x4 apple bin (that's 5.5 feet on the diagonal) 	NO <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Aluminum pots and pans with plastic handles Foil Ferrous (iron containing/magnetic) metals Electric motors Coax cable or other mixed metals 	Melted down into ingots for remanufacturing

Plastics 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> #1 <u>Clear</u> water and beverage bottles and food jars (color - like a green 7up bottle - is ok) #2 Translucent milk and vinegar jugs Bailing twine 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> NO Opaque #1 or #2 (such as detergent bottles) Must have a 'neck' or screw top—NO yogurt tubs or clamshell salad containers No Tupperware NO BOTTLE CAPS, please! 	#1 Plastic gets melted down into pellets for 3-D printers #2 Plastic goes into plastic lumber and furniture
E-Cycle 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Computer Towers/CPUs Computer Monitors Televisions (alone, or in a cabinet) up to 54" Laptops, Tablet PCs, and eReaders Portable DVD players (with their own screen) 	NO <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Peripherals (mice, keyboards, cameras, scanners, printers, copiers, extra cables) Stereo equipment, radios, CD/DVD players, VCRs Cell phones, gaming devices and other electronics 	Approved facilities with sound environmental practices separate metals, plastics, and glass for use in new products. Only about 2% ends up in landfill. Note: Working equipment or components may be donated or sold—you are responsible for removing your own data! See www.ecyclewashington.org
